

# **GP REFERRAL TO CLINICAL NURSE SPECIALIST CHALAZION CLINIC**

A chalazion is a condition in which an obstructed meibomian gland causes a granuloma within the tarsal plate.

### Symptoms:

Acute or chronic eyelid lump. Swelling, pain, tenderness, erythema of eyelid.

Signs

Visible or palpable well-defined subcutaneous nodule in the eyelid.

#### Treatment

If associated with blepharitis instruct patient re lid hygiene. Warm compress to eyelid with massage three times a day. Fucidic Acid 1% drops B.D. for one week or alternatively Chloromycetin BD for oneweek.

If the chalazion has not resolved two weeks after completing treatment patient may be referred for incision and curettage.

## Referral

Suitable patients to be referred to CNS chalazion clinic in Emergency Department. All referrals to the Nurseled Cyst clinic must be posted to the below address:

Patient will be contacted with appointment. If <u>not</u> suitable for CNS clinic – refer to OPD as usual.

#### Eligibility

The following referrals will not be accepted in the CNS chalazion clinic:

- Patients on Warfarin, Asprin or Plavix.
- Patients under 16 years of age.
- Recurrent chalazia at the same site.
- Chalazion in close proximity of the tear duct.
- Chalaxion on the lid margin.
- Ulcerated lid lesions.
- Lesions outside the lid area.
